### ITEM NO.1:

Sub: Confirmation of minutes of the 53rd meeting of Maharashtra Water Supply and Sewerage Board held on 13.2.1991.

Since no suggestions for modifications or amendments were received, the minutes were confirmed.

#### ITEM NO. 2:

Sub: Action taken, initiated or being taken on the actionable points in the minutes of 53rd meeting of the Board held on 13.2.1991

Shri. Rotkar enquired about the progress made in handing over of Tuljapur W.S. scheme and Jalna-Ambad W.S. scheme to the respective municipal councils. Secretary, Urban Development Department expressed that he had recently visited Jalna and there were many complaints about the execution of the scheme. The representatives of the Municipal council pointed out that, the item of mortar lining of pipes was dropped without consulting them. The

Action C.E.(Urban) C.E.(Project) Chairman then suggested that Board should evolve a procedure of independent joint inspection before handing over the schemes. He further stated that an outside body could be engaged for this work.

Action taken or initiated on all other points, was noted by the Board.

#### ITEM NO.3:

Sub: Consideration of Report of Committee for Restructuring organisation pattern of Maharashtra W.S. & Sewerage Board.

The Chairman stated that, as he is hard pressed for time, this item may be postponed to the next meeting. The Vice-Chairman, however, desired to make some suggestions regarding location of head quarters of the proposed regional Chief Engineers. The Chairman then suggested that the Member Secretary may discuss this issue with the Vice-Chairman before the next meeting of the Board.

# ITEM NO. 4:

Sub: Scheme for providing parallel Water Supply lines in different parts of Beed City.

The Member Secretary explained that this item has been put up before the Board only to point out that, even though the work is of urgent nature in the context of prevention of epidemics like jaundice which had occured in the last year, the work could not be taken up as the Municipal council failed to deposit the amount of popular contribution. The Board noted the delay, made by the Municipal council in payment of popular contribution.

Sub: Revised estimates for the year 1990-91

Action F.A.&CAO The Secretary, Rural Development Department, asked as to why there were reduction in receipts. The Financial Adviser and Chief Accounts Officer, clarified that, this year there were less receipts of E.T.P. charges because of less expenditure on works. #### ITEM NO. 6:

Sub: Budget Estimates for the year 1990-91.

The Secretary, Rural Development Department stated that the figure of grant-in-aid to be received by the Board from the Rural Development Department shown in agenda item did not agree with the Govt. figures. It was explained to him that these figures were taken from the department prior to the actual approval to the Budget Estimates by Govt., and therefore, there were some minor variations. These figures were ultimately corrected at the time of preparation of revised estimates. The Secretary, Rural Development Dept.,

Action F.A.& CAO then raised the point regarding heavy cash balance at the end of the year. This point was also clarified to him in a brief discussion. The Board then passed the following resolution:-

# ITEM NO. 7:

Sub: Revision of water rates for the year 1991-92 in respect of the Board's Water Works in Project Area.

The Member Secretary explained that there are two sets of water rates in the Board. The first set pertained to Water Works in Project area. He further explained that the average increase in rate proposed was only 14.04% and that it was expected to generate additional revenue of Rs.106.76 lakhs. The Secretary, Rural Development Department pointed

Action F.A.& CAO out that there appears to be no change in the retail non-domestic rate. He therefore, proposed that rates be revised to Rs. 7.50 per 1000 litres. The Chairman remaked that this suggestion can be accepted, and in case any representatations against the increase in rate are received, the position can be reviewed. It was then decided to revise this rate to Rs. 7.50 per 1000 litres for retail non-domestic water supply. The Board then passed the following resolution:-

# Charges for unmetered public stand posts:

- (a) For each unmetered Public Stand post Rs. 200 P.M.
- (b) If stand post is metered, responsibility for fixing and maintaining it will be that of the owner. If the meter is out of order for more than 3 months, charges will be levied for the consumption of average of last 3 months, or that for unmetered Public stand posts, whichever is more.

# DELAYED PAYMENT CHARGES:

The consumers who fails to pay water charges (including arrears) in a period of 30 days from the date of issue of bill, shall be liable to pay delayed payment charges at the rate of 18% P.A. on all the amounts outstanding against him on the date on which the period of 30 days after issue of bill ends. In case he fails to pay the delayed payment charges for a continuous period of six months, his supply is liable to be discontinued.

#### ITEM NO.8:

Sub: Revision of water rates for the year 1991-92 in respect of Board's water works outside Project area.

Secretary, U.D.D. referred to the statement at page No.73 of agenda notes and opined that there is no point in increasing the water rates when the Board is not able to recover the dues even at the existing rates. Shri. Mohan Gupte suggested that the Board should concentrate its efforts on the issue of recovery of arrears. The Chairman enquired as to when the water rates were last revised. The Member Secretary replied that they were revised last year from 1.6.1990. The Secretary, UDD. stated that he was not in favour of increasing the rate of domestic bulk supply to municipalities from Rs. 1.40 to Rs. 1.65 per 1000 litres.

as the increase would badly hit the consumers. The Member Secretary explained that, as a result of 35% increase in electricity charges, the expenditure on operation of water works had increased. Shri. Rotkar explained that it would be necessary to revise the water tariff almost every year in the context of increase in prices and hike in electricity charges etc. Normally, the water rates may have to be increased every year atleast by 10%. Electricity charges constitute about 40% of the expenditure on operation of water works

Action F.A.& CAO The FA&CAO pointed out that at the time of revision of water rates from 1.6.1990, there was a hike of 27%, but now the proposed increase is only 15% and this would give an additional revenue of Rs. 63.35 lakhs. The proposal was then approved and the following resolution was passed:

Sub: Augmentation to Chandrapur Water Supply Scheme-Payment towards compensation for land for Treatment Plant.

The Member Secretary briefly explained the contents of the agenda item. He pointed out that, for acquisition of agricultural land admeasuring 5 hectores, a provision of Rs. 81,000/- was made in the estimate and now as a result of Court order an amount of Rs. 1,30,76,605/- is required to be deposited in the Court towards compensation for land. He also pointed out that, while the cost of the treatment plant is Rs. 110 lakhs, the cost of land acquisition has come to Rs. 130.76 lakhs, The Board had gone in appeal to the Supreme Court, but it did not succeed.

Action C.E.(Urban) Secretary, Urban Development Department suggested that the issue as to how and why such high rates of compensation were recommended by the Land Acquisition Officer should be separately investigated. The Chairman supported this suggestion saying that serious malpractices have come to the notice of Govt. in land acquisition proceedings in Raigad district.

With the above discussion, the Board noted the contents of the agenda item.
